
Ending violence against women requires a collective effort. Let us stand together breaking down the barriers that divide us, and work towards a future where violence against women is unthinkable.

#### What We've Done So Far

Since our official launch in Parliament in May 2022, the Alliance hosted our first forum—Family Violence in Culturally Diverse Communities – Finding Support and Solutions Through Lived Experience. Attended by more than 50 representatives across multicultural communities, the forum raised awareness of the lack of culturally relevant services in the state. It shone a light on the gaps within our system that need to be addressed.

The central themes of this event were truth-telling and collaboration. We shared real-life case studies to ground our discussions. Our participants identified many barriers facing CALD women when they seek support. The event was a great debut for the Alliance, and a wonderful opportunity to bring community leaders, public sector representatives, and organisations together to discuss this malaise in our community.





On 7th March 2023, the Alliance hosted an International Women's Day panel at the Victorian Parliament. It brought together passionate and experienced women from the sector and parliamentarians. The goal was to identify solutions that could be used by multicultural services to meet the needs of victim-survivors from culturally diverse backgrounds.

# The consequence of the current funding model - Veena Barsiwal

Due to a lack of funding, earlier this year, Shakti Migrant & Refugee Women's Support Group Inc. Melbourne was forced to close its doors to the Asian, African, and Middle Eastern communities. Shakti Melbourne has been providing culturally-specific services since 2011 just like its 26-year-old parent organisation, Shakti Community Council Inc. New Zealand, which was set up by the migrant women and for the migrant women.

Shakti Melbourne, a social transformation organisation, aimed to become a driver of social change — supporting multicultural communities to live free of violence. It provided casework support, counselling, advocacy, education, and awareness. It also provided expertise to the state and federal governments on culturally-sanctioned abuses such as underage forced marriage, dowry violence, FGM, and honour-based violence.

Due to lack of funding Shakti Melbourne was unable to hire full-time or part-time staff and the role of volunteers became vital. It survived by providing placement opportunities and supervision to international social work Masters

working with family violence victimsurvivors. It continued to provide services through the COVID-19 lockdown although international students stopped coming to Melbourne, which threatened its existence.

Applying for grants is a competitive process and the organisation could not afford professional grant writers. Last year, Shakti Migrant & Refugee Women's Support Group Inc. (NSW) also ceased its services due to lack of funding.

Despite these issues, feedback from clients testifies the need for culturally appropriate services where one is understood and heard. Clients said:

"I do not have (just) somebody to talk to. I have the right person to talk to."

"I feel heard and understood after 14 years."

"You are the best thing that has happened to me. I can open up to you."

"I feel I can see (the situation) now. I was sleeping earlier."

#### What's Next For Us?

We hope our advocacy will increase funding for grassroots CALD-specific services. Our next event will be a roundtable discussion with Victorian multicultural service providers to understand the current state government funding model for multicultural family and domestic violence services. We aim to identify the current services receiving government support, and the gaps in government funding.

We plan to host this event on the 25<sup>th</sup> of July in Parliament House, with more information being circulated shortly.
